Dayton Police Department Mission Statement

The Dayton Police Department is committed to promoting a safe town through enforcement of laws, the prevention of crime, and education of laws, while providing excellence in public service through partnerships with our community.

The Dayton Police Department is led by Chief Trout and provides police services for the 1.2 square mile Town of Dayton. The Town of Dayton is a historic township with just under 2000 residents and situated just on the southern tip of the City of Harrisonburg within Rockingham County. Dayton was established in 1833 in the Shenandoah Valley. The town is growing with new housing developments to begin construction in 2024 adding to Dayton's population and size. The department has six police officers who are trained in all aspects of police work. Dayton Police officers need extensive knowledge in patrol, investigations, and forensics to provide quality services for the community.

In 2019, when Chief Justin Trout became Chief of Police, the department was in need of rebuilding and rebranding. The department began to focus on recruitment of qualified officers with a working knowledge of police work. The goal was to build a department with a reputation for success in our community and build relationships with all law enforcement agencies in the area. The department started the accreditation process with VLEPSC in 2022. The department has completed their initial assessment and is to go before the VLEPSC Commission in March of 2024 to become an accredited agency.

The Dayton Police Department has MOUs with the Rockingham County Sheriff's office and the Town of Bridgewater Police Department to provide police services when needed. The Department is one of five town police departments that is a member of the Rockingham Police Town Group (RPTG). The members of the RPTG hold five training sessions a year together. RPTG was developed to provide quality training in firearms, defensive tactics, driving, and scenario based trainings for the towns to improve and maintain police efficiency.

Instructor Spotlight

Officer Walter Sharp

Harrisonburg Police Department



Officer Sharp has wanted to serve as a police officer since elementary school. He joined the Harrisonburg Police Department as an Auxiliary Police Officer in December 2020, graduated first in his BLE 143 class in May 2021, and was certified as a DCJS General Instructor in September 2021. He transferred to paid part time status with HPD in September 2022, and enjoys serving the Harrisonburg community as a patrol officer and teaching Terrorism/Counterterrorism and Freedom of Information/Privacy Act classes at CSCJTA.

A graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, Officer Sharp is a retired Marine combat veteran and a retired civilian Department of Defense intelligence professional. During his military career, Officer Sharp served as a Deputy Legal Counsel to General Colin Powell, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; commanding officer of a field artillery battery; and a senior prosecutor. After his retirement from the U.S. Marine Corps, he served as Secretary Colin Powell's Legislative Director of Global and Functional Affairs at the U.S. Department of State; Deputy Law Librarian at the U.S. Law Library of Congress; and Senior Associate Deputy General Counsel for Intelligence (general officer equivalent) at the U.S. Department of Defense.

Officer Sharp holds a bachelor of science in aerospace engineering, a law degree, two masters of law, and a doctorate of law from the University of Virginia. Education, teaching, and training are very important to Officer Sharp. He taught graduate level law courses as an Adjunct Professor of Law at Georgetown University Law Center for more than ten years and is now proud to continue his teaching career at CSCJTA. He finds that his experience as an attorney and a former prosecutor makes responding to citizen's calls for service and investigating crimes much more interesting and rewarding.




